

GREAT RELAY PERFORMANCE AT THE BRITISH

EDITORIAL

I was most relieved that our event at The Trossachs was blessed with such good weather. It's a great area but quite exposed in places and with, inevitably, some long times could have been less than pleasant had the weather turned nasty.

It was certainly an interesting area in which to plan. Bering a World Ranking Event dictated long courses for elite, with recommended winning times of 60-70 minutes (women) and 75-90 minutes (men). Actual winning times were 72 and 84 respectively so not far off! To have got the majority of badge times into the recommended range would have meant having most of the courses only two-thirds of their actual length, with M21L only 60% of M21E. This apparent anomaly arises because we had a World Ranking Event which was not a National Event, but merely a Badge Event. Is this not rather a strange situation?

However if courses had been shortened then certain classes would have been too short. In particular M16A where times were impressive, not merely for the winner but for a large part of the field.

Going back to the weekend before Trossachs the JK Trophy weekend was held in the Forest of Dean. As the UK's premier event there were a few things which did not create the best impression. For example the start lists were only in the order of entry which is of little use. At a small event it is easy enough to find a name but with several hundred in many of the classes this is hopeless. Another niggle was that a set of control descriptions was not provided; you had to write out your own. What sort of impression does this create for overseas visitors? (I've just received control descriptions for a National event in the Lake District and again it's do-it-yourself so maybe that's the norm in England).

As you may notice from the front page this is issue 150 - maybe that should mean a special bumper edition? However lack of time means it will just be a normal issue. I'll leave the special for issue 200, when I still hope to be orienteering but certainly do not plan to be editor then!

CLUB CAPTAIN'S CHAT MAY 2002

FVO Men Strike Silver at British Champs!

It has been a busy couple of months since I last wrote a few paragraphs for the newsletter, and FVO members have been running well at events all over the UK in the intervening period.

Early March saw the Compass Sport Cup Scottish round at Cademuir near Peebles, and many thanks to all those club members who made the effort to come along - both those who ran early in snow/hail and those who ran late and enjoyed the bright sunshine and glorious views! Particular congratulations to those club members who won their courses: Jason Inman on Brown and Stuart Thomson on Orange. In the end we finished third in our match and will not be at the final this year - if Will Hensman and the master maps had been at the start at the same time, and if Dave Coustick had copied down the correct course then we would have challenged hard for victory. Next year maybe!

The Easter weekend saw club members travelling to the Forest of Dean for the annual Jan Kjellstrom event, a two day individual with a relay on Easter Monday. Around 20 club members made the journey, and Hilda Astbury produced the only FVO prizewinning performance, winning W75L by just 6 seconds over the two days. On the elite courses then the leading FVO runners were Nick Barrable in 11th place and Lisa Brown in 16th place.

Relay day at the JK saw a return to the nicest parts of the Day One forest, and some very fast times. In the men's relay Will Hensman showed the benefits of resting up on the Sunday by producing an excellent run, coming back 5th on the first leg. Fraser Purves and Jason Inman both lost time and the team slipped back to 18th, but another fine run by Nick Barrable on the 4th leg brought the team up to 13th place. The women's team went three places better, Lisa Brown coming in 14th on leg one, Cathy Tilbrook holding position, and Beccy Osborn coming through to 10th on last leg. These places represent a steady start in terms of UK Relay League points for this year, but both teams were a little disappointed and left the event promising to do better at the British Champs.......

After the JK, both Nick and Lisa ran well on the elite courses at the World Ranking Event that FVO hosted at the Trossachs (Nick 6th and Lisa 9th). This event was also well covered by the local press, most reporting the details and results, and some carrying a photo of Lisa running through the terrain. Lisa was successful again the following week on another FVO area, finishing a close second for Glasgow University in the individual event at the British Student Championships held on the Touch Estate.

This flurry of important events was rounded off by the British Championships, held over the May bank holiday weekend. These were in Northern Ireland for the first time ever, and the entire weekend was blessed with magnificent sunny weather, showing off the crags of the short race, the sand dunes of the classic race and the parkland of the relay all at their best. In the elite short race on the Saturday, Steve Nicholson showed that he is starting to return to fitness with 14th place, just behind Nick in 12th and ahead of Jason in 27th. For the women then Beccy was 21st and Lisa 27th.

The terrain for the classic race was open dunes with detailed contours and plenty of spiky vegetation! Hilda completed a British/JK double in W75L, and Hazel Dean, Beccy and Lisa all ran strongly in the women's elite, placing 13th, 17th and 21st respectively. For the men then, amidst accusations of pot-hunting, Steve Nicholson placed 2nd on M21S and Jason tied for 1st on M21L (having won M21S last year - the commentary was certainly suggesting this meant he was favourite for M21E next year...!). Meanwhile Stuart Thomson was just out of the prizes in 4th on M12A, and father Mark was a good 2nd on M35S. On the men's elite then top FVO runner was once more Nick Barrable, who ran well after early mistakes and placed 15th, just 3 minutes from the top 6. This result secured Nick's position in the 2002 UK Cup as 6th overall, so many congratulations to him on a fine series of results this year.

Plenty of FVO members had made the journey across to Northern Ireland and so we were able to field a good number of relay teams. In the Ad Hoc, Stuart Thomson ran strongly round leg one to hand over in 3rd place, and the team held on well to finish just inside the top 20. On the Women's Short, then Peggy Purves, Maureen Brown and Penny Hicks all ran well, with Penny bringing the team up from 13th to 9th on the final leg. However, just as at the JK it was the men's and women's open teams that showed up the best. For the women then a late change of running order saw Beccy run first and hand over to Lisa in 11th place. Lisa ran the same time but pulled the team up to 7th place, and a flying leg from Hazel brought the women home in an impressive 6th place.

In the men's race (for three rather than four as it is at the JK), the FVO team was reinforced by the return of Steve Nicholson, and Will handed over to him for leg 2 in 14th place, less than 3 minutes down. Steve ran very strongly on leg 2 to move all the way through to 8th place, and send out Nick around two and a half minutes behind the leader, Tim Lenton from Interlopers. A fantastic run from Nick round the first part of the course meant that at the spectator control on the far side of the valley he had moved all the way through to 2nd place. He continued to close round the final loop, but Interlopers hung on to win, with Nick running the second fastest time of the day to bring the FVO team home in the silver medal position. Many congratulations to Will, Steve and Nick on a great performance!

Meanwhile FVO second team (Fraser Purves, Martin Dean and Jason) weren't doing so badly themselves, and worked their way through the field to finish in 13th place - one place behind Interlopers second team(!), and quite a few UK Relay League points for the second team too! Clearly another crack at beating Interlopers is needed, and what better opportunity than the Scottish Championships relays, part of the Scottish Championships weekend near Inverness on 1/2 June. There is still time to sign up and run in the FVO teams, but if you do want a run then please tell me by 13 May please. I'm also still looking for people to run in the Harvester night/day relay near Hexham on 31 August/1 September [Note this is the new date for the Harvester, Score is out of date stating May. Ed], followed by the Scottish 11-person relay near Dumfries on 1 September, so if you are interested then please let me know.

NORWAY HOLIDAY?

Good day there! My name is Mike Down. I hope many of you know who I am, through Orienteering sport, Fell-running, the Anglo-Norse Society, the Welsh-Norwegian Society, and the Civil Service Motoring Association.

I used to work at Kvitaavatn Fjellstoge, an Outdoor Pursuits Hotel in the Telemark Fjell of Norway. It was begun around 1970 my an ex- UK Royal Marine Major: Rod. Tuck. These days the Stoge is owned by a Danish Co-operative who organise skiing vacations for themselves and their business, all winter. It is nearly always fully booked from Christmas to Easter. In summer there is self-catering accommodation at the traditional craft village (haandverkstun) around the Hotel.

I am now involved in marketing activities and tourism at and from Kvitaavatn Fjellstoge, to utilize the facilities of the Hotel between May and October. 2002 is the first attempt.

Below I shall set out what I want to arrange (this year):

There is a ferry sailing from Newcastle-upon-Tyne to Kristiansand on Friday September 6th at @ 15.00. There is a ferry sailing from Kristiansand to Newcastle-upon-Tyne on Sunday September 15th. Kristiansand is @ 4 hours car trip up Numedal & across the mountains to Kvitaavatn near Rjukan in Telemark.

I am circulating most of the Orienteering Clubs in GB; and using magazines and the internett to contact Fell-Runners in Athletic Clubs; and the regular newsletters of the Anglo-Norse Society, and Welsh-Norwegian Society; to propose a "package deal" for @ 120 people to holiday from Kvitaavatn Fjellstoge for the week between September 7th and 15th..

Essentially the accommodation is in the hotel, but we will arrange our own catering. The rooms sleep from 2 - 6 people each. There is also a group room; and superior accommodation could be arranged as an upgrade. For hotel see http://www.kvitaavatn.no

We will also arrange our own transport (in our own cars): "but" since there will be around 30 cars I will endeavour to get a group booking and favourable terms with DFDS Ferries for the return trip. Obviously this will need earlier commitment from the participants. I will also arrange for a chef, and trainers, and guides, for the outdoor pursuits: such as Orienteering training (at various degrees of difficulty); Fell-running; and also Kayaking & Sail-boarding (bring your own) and fishing (local licences available). For those who only wish to tour mostly by car: Rjukan was the site of "The Heroes of Telemark"; there are Silver Mines at Kongsberg; the famous Stavekirke at Heddal; Lake Mosvatn leading into the Hardangervidda; the Telemark Boat Canal; and many Museums, and other local tourist attractions; such as the cable-car.

There is also a 5 star hotel next door to Kvitaavatn Fjellstoge called Gaustablikk Hoeyefjellshotell, with tennis and swimming pool, together with shopping and a restaurant.

I expect to cater for three Orienteering Clubs: 12 people from each; using 3 cars per club. I expect to cater for @ 32 Fell-Runners: ie in cars of 4 passengers that makes for 8 cars & @ 8 rooms accommodation.

I expect to cater for @ 32 members of the Anglo-Norse Society; on a similar basis.

I expect to cater for @ 28 members of the Welsh-Norwegian Society; "

Roughly then I hope to organize 10 days holiday for around 100 - 120 guests; at favourable self-catering rates; but with our own chef and perhaps shared domestic services; with organized activities for Orienteering and Fell-running; local advice and guidance available for less formal activities.
