

#### President's Column

Another two months have past and seemingly very quickly. It's been a busy time for me, though I've not done too much orienteering during the period. I did a double badge event in The Lakes in September as a warm up for the Veterans' Home International in Ireland; I've reported separately on this elsewhere in this issue

Then I had a long weekend in Lithuania which was not a great success. Not only did I not do that well in the two day Lithuanian Cup, but as many of you will know, I got mugged in Vilnius on my last night there. As a result of that I'm still feeling a bit concussed and so am not yet running in competitions, though hope to be soon.

Wednesday evening training! Yes - Wednesday comes every week which is more than can be said for our attendance which has averaged about 1.2. I think at least two weeks there was nobody there (as that includes me I can't be 100% sure!). Those days when I have been there it's more often than not been two, once reaching the dizzy heights of four runners. I cannot make 3 or 10 November but hopefully some of you will be there. Technical training was the focus of the Aviemore weekend at the end of October. For a change from Glenmore Lodge we stayed at Aviemore youth hostel which worked out well. The training exercises took place at Uath Lochans, which was the National Centre's "Map of the Month". There was plenty of emphasis on contours with several exercises taking place using brown only maps.

Looking ahead I shall be away for five months this winter, as I'm spending the ski season in Argentiere, near Chamonix. I have rented a small apartment there and hope to see some of you out there for some skiing. One result of that is that I shall not be attending the AGM in January. I had in any case intended to stand down as President and from any committee post this year, although I still intend to be doing things behind the scenes. Also standing down from the committee is Hugh Buchanan, who has done a great job in the last couple of years with handling fixtures and permissions. So we are looking for some new blood on the committee please don't be shy!

FVO has been a member of Stirling Sports Council for many years. They have developed a scheme of "Charter Clubs". Stirling Sports Council's aim for charter clubs is to:

"Encourage the establishment and operation of structured, safe sports clubs, with the potential to develop and expand accordingly".

So, what's in it for FVO?

Being mercenary, improved support from Stirling Sports council, than if we were not chartered. Apart from non-financial support offered by the council, monetary grants to non-chartered clubs are reduced by 50%

Sounds good, so what do we have to do?

In many ways, the requirements to become chartered are to show that the club is well run, and to develop many of the administrative developments that the club has taken on in the last few years. For example, did you know that the club has a development policy? It's there on our web site. The SOA has a child protection policy, which we have adopted as club policy. We will have to develop a few similar guidelines. We will put details on the club website.

Is that it?

We will see when we put our application form in shortly.

#### Captain's Chat

Until I sat down to write this article, then I thought that there had been hardly any orienteering since the summer and that I would have relatively little to say this time. However, it turns out that much has been happening and it is more that I have not being doing much orienteering myself (I discovered this when I was greeted at an event this weekend with the words "what are you doing here, this is an orienteering event!")!

I do have an excuse for not going to many of the events I talk about though – you had to be good enough or young enough (or both) to get selected for them!

One of these was the junior competition for Scottish clubs, the Jamie Stevenson Trophy in September. Our junior team put in a fantastic performance to try and improve on last year's third place, and so nearly improved all the way to first place. In the end just 2 points out of nearly 600 separated our team from the winners, MAROC, and all our juniors should be very proud of the team effort they put up and the team spirit they showed. Special mention should go to Victoria Longhurst and this year's newcomer, Jamie Stevenson, both of whom won their courses.

And he may not have won his course at the Jamie Stevenson Trophy (next year...), but also very good news for Kyle Heron in October, when he was a late call up to the GB team for the Junior European Cup races in southern England, making his full international debut. Kyle ran particularly well in the sprint race and the relay, in a competition which is for M20s as well as his age class, M18 – some of the FVO senior men had better watch out at the club champs as Kyle is apparently bidding for the senior trophy this year!

Other international races saw Marcus Pinker running for Ireland in the World Championships, where a really good run in the middle distance qualifier left him a tantalising one place short of qualifying for the final, and where his second leg in the relay pulled the Irish team up a number of places.

In the Veteran Home International in Ireland, no fewer than five FVO members were in the Scotland team – Steve Barrett, Martin and Hazel Dean, Dave Coustick and Gareth Bryan-Jones. Congratulation in particular to Martin and Hazel, both of whom won their courses, and commiserations in particular to Gareth and Hazel for the unfortunate disqualification of their relay team after Gareth had brought the team through to win the race on the final leg.

International congratulations also to Nick Barrable, who has been selected in the recently announced GB squad for 2005 (unlike this year's British Champion!), and is headed off to Japan and China for a training camp in preparation for the world championships in Japan next year.

We have also most recently had the Scottish Score Championships and the Scottish Night Championships. At the first of these (which concluded a very enjoyable FVO training weekend based in Aviemore), FVO took a 1-2 finish in the men

#### A Short Trip to Ireland

As the rain started came the first mistake; no, not on the course but driving into Glasgow. Both Steve B and I saw the sign indicating delays at roadworks but did not interpret it correctly. Soon after an unnecessary diversion through Cumbernauld to avoid Auchenkilns we arrived at the roadworks where the holdup really was. Fortunately this was not too long and we continued through the worsening rain and on to the A77 via Ayr to Cairnryan.

Just a few miles before the ferry port the truck in front of us put its rear wheels in the ditch and skidded sideways. Don't block the road we thought; it's a long way round. Luckily the truck regained the road and we arrived in Cairnryan with time to spare – time to spend in the car with rain lashing down.

A two hour crossing and we were in a much brighter Larne, heading south along the racetrack to Belfast and then south to Newry. We drove into a dead end road to be greeted by Hilary from the car behind us. 'I thought you knew where you were going,' she said. 'We do,' I replied. 'We're parking for that pizzeria.' Hilary and her group were going straight to the event centre before eating so as not to be late for our team meeting. The four of us — Chris Macleod and Norma Coutts were also in the car — were soon joined in the restaurant by four more of the Scottish team.

After eating we drove the final six miles into the Republic though there was little to indicate the change of country apart from the occasional unusual road sign. 'Welcome to Tain Holiday Village" the sign proclaimed; this was where we were staying and it sounded pretty grand. However reality was rather different — Club Med has nothing to worry about! Ten bunks to a room and each bunk equipped with a plastic coated mattress, thin duvet and even thinner pillow.

Time for the team meeting, but where was our team manager? So much for rushing on from Newry. After a none-too-good night's sleep we feasted on muesli and soggy toast before venturing out into the morning chill. By the time we had driven up the hill to the car park it was all of 7°C and windy. The relay seemed to be going well when our first relay team finished in the lead after the last leg, only to be disqualified when Gareth could not find the backup punch on a non-working SI unit. However several English teams came in before our next teams, so England would still have won the relay competition.

The attraction of Tain Holiday Village being less than that of a compass needle in a weak magnetic field, the afternoon was to be tea-room time. Martin's ability to find tea-rooms in Scotland is on a par with his finding controls. However while he succeeded in the latter in Ireland the same cannot be said of the former. The first one he rejected was later found to be the best in the area and the next place was full. So on to Dundalk where he turned off into a housing estate just before the tea-room which we eventually did find, with monster scones to fill us up.

Unfortunately Pauline MacAdam fell just before her penultimate control. She limped the last two controls thinking she had a bad ankle sprain. However it turned out she had broken her leg so it was very impressive that she finished to help Scotland to clinch the individual trophy but we had to be content with second in the combined competition.

An enjoyable weekend for most of us. Our best wishes to Pauline for a speedy recovery.
