Coach of the year.

British Orienteering's Junior Lead Coach Jason Inman was the deserving winner in the Coach of the Year category at the Club Sport Stirling Awards in November.

The Scottish Institute of Sport has its headquarters in Stirling, and as a result the standard of these awards has become hugely impressive in recent years.



Alongside this the ceremony itself has grown in stature into an increasingly glitzy and well attended evening, and several hundred people were there to applaud Jason's success ahead of a number of other strong candidates.

Jason has been coaching orienteering for 20 years, having started at age 17 during the time when he was also the dominant force in British junior orienteering (British Champion four times in a row from M17-M20). Injury in the early part of his senior career saw him get more involved in coaching as a way of giving something back to the sport, and he has contributed significantly to the development and success of many British athletes who have come through the junior ranks since the mid 1990s. This year saw him as Lead Coach at his 10th Junior World Championships (JWOC), and many of those who have progressed to the senior team owe much to his coaching skills.

His success as Coach of the Year was in recognition of his contribution at local level as well as at international level. Recently based in Edinburgh and now near Stirling, he has worked with the pool of talent at Edinburgh University and successfully managed the Scottish Senior Team to success in the home internationals in 2005 and 2006. Alongside this he is currently personal coach to Doug Tullie (Britain's top performer at this year's JWOC) and also to highly promising FVO junior Jamie Stevenson, already a Scottish international hill runner as well as orienteer. This year he has established a full weekly training regime for Forth Valley Orienteers, and his energy and enthusiasm has helped ensure high levels of attendance right across the range of age classes.

As well as his impressive list of coaching success, the judging panel were particularly impressed with his commitment to helping athletes at all levels, and that wherever he has lived he has involved himself in the coaching side locally. The Scottish Orienteering Association would like to join Forth Valley Orienteers in congratulating Jason on his well-deserved award, thanking him for all his efforts on their behalf, and wishing him much more coaching success in the future.

The Orient-Show

The Thomson family were not at the club champs or the Dinner dance as we were 600 miles South at the Orient-Show in Villeneuve d'Ascq, near Lille which is twinned with Stirling. This event was the most fun I have had orienteering for a long time and all for 5 euros! We had an early start to get the 7:40 channel tunnel crossing and arrived in France at 9:25 local time. It took about an hour and a half to get to Lille and the area had been set up. It looked amazing, hundreds of fences and more controls than you could imagine. Every knoll, at each corner, every flag pole and several plastic trees all had controls on them. There were also two areas of fencing full of controls!



We had to do four qualifiers and be in the top 64 to progress to the quarter final. The four qualifiers had to be run any time between 2 o'clock and 5 o'clock but no one wanted to go first. Craig and I decided we would go first but the start officials would not let us start as there were four start lanes and they wanted four people to start at the same time. Eventually after some shouting to the waiting crowd and Stuart finishing his warm up we had four people and were led through the tent to the start. The reason the start is in the tent is so the next four competitors can not see which control you go to first. I set off on course A which was 800m with 40 controls, the first of which was about 20m away and as I passed it I thought hang on that's it, stop punch and off to the next control

which was a little further away but came up really quick. There was no time to look at a compass you just had to run, punch and keep running. As I approached number three Craig asked me where he was! He had over shot number one and was blown away by the number of controls and the scale. I pointed him in the right direction and carried on. The larger maze of fences did not have a middle which threw me as I was relying on that to relocate! I made my way through slowly at first until I got the hang of turning and punching. The rules are you can not lean across the fences you have to go around. Stuart finished first but had 2 penalties for bad punches which added 30 seconds each then I finished with no
